

# Health Coverage for All Children: Nevada

#### All Children Need Health Coverage that is Affordable, Comprehensive, and Simple.

### **Health Coverage for Nevada's Children:**

- 113,000 children are uninsured (15.9% of all children).
- 149,923 children are enrolled in Medicaid.
- 31,554 children are enrolled in the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

## How affordable is health coverage for Nevada's children? †

- CHIP eligibility is up to 200 percent of poverty (\$44,700 for a family of four).
- Medicaid eligibility is 133 percent of poverty (\$29,726) for children 0-5 and 100 percent of poverty (\$22,050) for children 6-19.

## How simple are enrollment procedures in CHIP and Medicaid for Nevada's children?

- Simplification procedures:
  - 12 month continuous enrollment for children enrolled in CHIP only
  - No face-to-face interview
  - No asset test
  - Administrative verification of income for Medicaid only.
- Barriers that remain:
  - No joint application
  - 6 month waiting period
  - No 12 month continuous eligibility for children in Medicaid
  - No presumptive eligibility—which forces children to wait until their application is processed before they can see a doctor.
  - No administrative verification of income for CHIP—the state requires parents to provide proof of income before a child can get health coverage.

#### Do children in Nevada's CHIP program receive the same comprehensive benefits as children in Medicaid?

Yes. Nevada provides children in its CHIP program the same comprehensive health and mental health coverage (through the Early and Periodic Screening Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT) benefit) that all children in Medicaid receive.
