All Children Need Health Coverage that is Affordable, Comprehensive, and Simple.

Health Coverage for Washington's Children:

- 108,000 children are uninsured (6.5% of all children).
- 660,730 children are enrolled in Medicaid.
- 35,894 children are enrolled in the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

How affordable is health coverage for Washington's children? [†]

- CHIP eligibility is 300 percent of poverty (\$66,150 for a family of four).
- Medicaid eligibility is 200 percent of poverty (\$44,100) for children.

How simple are enrollment procedures in CHIP and Medicaid for Washington's children?

- Simplification procedures:
 - 12-month continuous eligibility for children
 - No face-to-face interview
 - Joint application
 - No asset test
 - Administrative verification of income at enrollment and renewal—the state does not require parents to provide proof of income before a child can get health coverage
- Barriers that remain:
 - 4-month waiting period
 - No presumptive eligibility—which forces children to wait until their application is processed before they can see a doctor
 - No

Do children in Washington CHIP program receive the same comprehensive benefits as children in Medicaid?

 Yes. Washington provides children in its CHIP program the same comprehensive health and mental health coverage (through the Early and Periodic Screening Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT) benefit) that all children in Medicaid receive.
