# Children in the States 2019 OREGON 

## Child Population

- 873,619 children lived in Oregon in 2017.
- 36 percent were children of color: 2 percent were Black; 22 percent were Hispanic; 5 percent were Asian/Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander; and 1 percent were American Indian/Alaska Native.


## Child Poverty

- 16 percent of Oregon's children were poor in 2017-a total of 141,151 children-and children of color were disproportionately poor.
- 32 percent of Black, 24 percent of Hispanic and 14 percent of White children were poor.
- 6 percent of children were extremely poor (their family had income below half the poverty level).
- 19 percent of children under 6 were poor.


## Income and Wealth Inequality

- $\$ 77,300$ was the median income for White families with children compared with \$37,500 for Black and \$44,500 for Hispanic families in 2017.


## Housing and Homelessness

- 24,322 homeless children were enrolled in public schools during 2016-2017.
- 2 full-time jobs at minimum wage were needed for a family to afford a two-bedroom rental unit at fair market rent in 2018.


## Child Hunger and Nutrition

- 20 percent of children lived in food-insecure households in 2016.
- 24 percent of children ages 10-17 were overweight or obese in 2017.
- 25 percent of children relied on the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) in FY2017.
- 84 percent of children receiving free or reducedprice lunch during the 2016-2017 school year did not participate in Summer Nutrition Programs in 2017.


## Child Health

- 32,974 children ages 0-18 (4 percent) were uninsured in 2017.
- 618,437 children ages 0-18 were enrolled in Oregon Health Plan (Medicaid) and Healthy Kids (Children's Health Insurance Program) in FY2017.


## Early Childhood

- $\$ \mathbf{1 3 , 2 9 2}$ was the average annual cost for an infant in center-based child care in 2017.
- 12 percent of 4-year-olds were enrolled in statefunded preschool during 2017-2018.


## Education

- 83 percent of Hispanic and 60 percent of White $4^{\text {th }}$ grade public school students could not read at grade level in 2017.
- 81 percent of Hispanic and 57 percent of White $8^{\text {th }}$ grade public school students could not read at grade level in 2017.
- 66 percent of Black, 69 percent of Hispanic and 77 percent of White students graduated high school on time during 2015-2016.
- 9 percent of Black, 4 percent of Hispanic and 4 percent of White public secondary students had at least one out-of-school suspension in 20132014.


## Child Welfare

- 11,070 children were abused or neglected in 2017.
- 7,972 children were in foster care on the last day of FY2017.


## Juvenile Justice

- $\mathbf{1 , 1 1 3}$ children were in residential placement in 2015. 13 percent were Black; 24 percent were Hispanic; and 56 percent were White.
- $\mathbf{0}$ children were in adult jails or prisons in 2016.


## Gun Violence

- 27 children and teens were killed with guns in 2017.
