- Nutrition and health










Scholars by State

National Day of Social Action



This summer, planet earth was the focus of *CDF Freedom School's*National Day of Social Action.
Washington, D.C. scholars and their families gathered with posters, drums, and megaphones to demand that their local government address climate change with children and youth in mind.

National Day of Social Action lends scholars the five components in the CDF Freedom Schools curriculum to amplify their voices and apply them to the real world. Scholars strategically linked global climate change to local issues that affect them directly:

Rooting From Climate Change

 Scholars unpacked how shifting weather patterns that threaten food production and rising sea levels increase the risk of deadly flooding, putting more lives at risk.



 Scholars participated in local trash cleanups at multiple sites, advocating for cleaner neighborhoods and a cleaner planet.



 Scholars in grades 6-8 researched the Flint water crisis and discussed environmental racism.
