Health Coverage for All Children: South Dakota



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All Children Need Health Coverage that is Affordable, Comprehensive, and Simple.

Health Coverage for South Dakota's Children:

- 20,000 children are uninsured (9.3% of all children).
- 83,094 children are enrolled in Medicaid.
- 15,872 children are enrolled in the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).***

How affordable is health coverage for South Dakota's children? †

- CHIP eligibility is up to 200 percent of poverty (\$44,700 for a family of four).
- Medicaid eligibility is 133 percent of poverty (\$29,726) for children 0-5 and 100 percent of poverty (22,350) for children 6-19.

How simple are enrollment procedures in CHIP and Medicaid for South Dakota's children?

- Simplification procedures:
 - No face-to-face interview
 - No asset test
 - Joint application
- Barriers that remain:
 - 3 month waiting period
 - No 12-month continuous eligibility
 - No presumptive eligibility—which forces children to wait until their application is processed before they can see a doctor.
 - No administrative verification of income—the state requires parents to provide proof of income before a child can get health coverage.
